A Message From Our President - Sandra Gamble



Since meeting at Spring Gathering in April when Rosie was our guest speaker, it is very good to be able to report that Mothers' Union Diocese of Salisbury (with our branches, groups and Diocesan members) goes forward into the next Triennium - when the 150th anniversary celebrations of the foundation of Mothers' Union will take place as well.

To get here has been a struggle, as you will appreciate from the number of appeals and pleas for a few members to come forward to keep MU in the Diocese afloat. In order to maintain a Board, a minimum of 3 trustees is required under our Constitution, which is quite normal. Despite the appeals and following nomination papers going out in February and

Spring Gathering taking place with further pleas in late April, nominations remained at 2 only (DP and General Trustee) from the present Board - with one other current Co-opted Trustee prepared again to be co-opted, but co-option requires a Board to undertake appointment.

I am more than thankful, therefore, that, faced with this shortage of volunteers to form a diocesan board and prevent closure altogether, two additional current trustees, albeit originally planning to step down in 2025, agreed that their names should go forward as General Trustees for the next Triennium, as did a former retired trustee who, at the time of writing, has offered to return and submitted her nomination form — thus providing 5 nominations. Nominations remained open, however, because a very large diocese, such as Salisbury, with it needs to focus on governance, its members, pastoral fellowship, worship and community outreach, needs an appropriate number of volunteers to function effectively.

Your new Board will be revealed at this Autumn Gathering (together now with two members willing to be co-opted once the new Board is formed). It appears that there will be no need for an election. Hopefully as well, Jenny's and Suzanne's replacements can also be announced - as both Jenny (after 20 years) and Suzanne (after 12 years) are retiring from their roles as Diocesan Secretary and Diocesan Treasurer at the end of this year.

However, backtracking if I may. It is apparent that there are two fundamental issues facing MU Britain and Ireland currently - which MSH is trying to help resolve:

- the rapid on-going decline in membership; and
- the fact that it is increasingly difficult for MU to recruit full trustee boards in all dioceses and the risk that some dioceses are fast becoming inoperable.

Although the two overlap, they are separate issues and MU Diocese of Salisbury faces both.

Our membership, while totalling 2,159 in 2010, numbered just in excess of 700 in 2023 and now in 2024 has dropped to within the 600 figure. This is not unusual

regarding Mothers' Union in Britian and Ireland as membership continues to decline at a rate of 6% a year. The main strategic focus of the central charity, therefore, to try to counter this decline, is to develop and deliver new ways to increase members and charity funds while continuing to support existing members, our clergy, parishes, branches/groups and dioceses. We see, for example, that, with a small new "membership" team in place, MSH is delivering against the Reimagining priorities raised by members in 2022 – by creating a "Church-based Membership" pilot and a "Gifts of MU" project.

As regards failure to recruit full trustee boards, MSH has set up a Southwest Cluster Pilot (comprised of the 8 south west dioceses) to explore a legal restructuring of Mothers' Union with a view to sustaining Mothers' Union branches, groups and diocesan membership in dioceses themselves facing closure. This is under the leadership of Mothers' Union central charity CEO Bev Jullien and Finance Director Richard Miller and comprises a steering group of Diocesan Presidents and an additional Trustee from each of the 8 dioceses. Treasurers from the 8 dioceses are beginning in July to meet as well.

The pilot is still in development stage needing to produce a wholly new constitution, rules and regulations, policies and procedures, governance manual and resolution of accounting, finance and data issues. In Salisbury, we have been fully involved as members of the steering and treasurer groups - represented by myself, Carrie and Suzanne - working on these matters to achieve agreement with the other 7 dioceses in order to go forward. It is a complete restructuring, legally and financially, of part of MU in Britain and Ireland requiring agreement to be reached by the 8 dioceses - with ultimate potential appeal to other Britain and Ireland clusters that may wish to follow suit.

However, until all aspects are in place, the pilot is not ready to be launched. When it is, 2/3rds of members present and voting will determine whether the Diocese of Salisbury will join the cluster. Naturally, as we get closer to that date, you will be formally informed of the benefits, and canvassed, but it will not be the first time you have heard from me informally what joining will look like.

I am delighted to say that several members, attending the Members' Gathering in Oxford in June, returned enthused by what they witnessed Mothers' Union undertaking in other dioceses – and Salisbury, the only diocese with a Virtual Baby programme! Our Rockley Park project too continues smoothly, immediately following Sheila's passing, thanks to Alison and Jill picking up where Sheila and Suzanne left off. But again, "the importance of your support that our holiday home provides; the good work that the Virtual Babies do for teenagers in our schools; the joy that is brought to a prisoner's children by the sending of a gift through Angel Tree; the vital provision we give to the Women's Refuge; and the comfort and encouragement brought to all those who receive knitted items" cannot continue without help – which does not require being a Trustee. As little or as much is all it will take to keep our projects on course with your help and support.

Trustees are very aware that all of the above is a BIG ASK as our membership becomes more elderly and has already undertaken many responsibilities – and still does in your parishes. But what of the 150th anniversary celebrations? Already, as I write at the end of July, ideas are being requested for what might be done nationally and/or locally. By the time of our Autumn Gathering in October, I imagine this will have become the priority topic. And so it should, as we continue to follow with pride in our founder Mary Sumner's footsteps.

I am continuing to serve you as treasurer as we have had no enquiries from branches, parishes or from an advert in the diocesan Grapevine newsletter, please continue to pray that someone will come forward. I really do not want to step down and leave you without a treasurer, especially as we are at the end of another triennium and several of our trustees are stepping down and we will be welcoming a couple of new trustees.

As always my thanks to Alison Oakes for the sterling work she does in collecting gift aid annually. Don't forget, if you pay the Inland Revenue tax on your earnings, pensions, savings, by completing a Gift Aid form (obtainable from the office, Jenny or myself), we are able to collect 25p in the pound from your annual subscription and any donations you make. Branch treasurers, please remember to check with your members when you are completing the annual subscription forms. Thank you treasurers for all the work you do in your branches and thank you branches for all your fund-raising efforts.


Our 2024 membership to date is 653 a reduction of 60 members. Twenty-three pounds per member has been sent to MSH (my apologies, in the Spring edition I wrote that it was £25). For 2025 MSH has increased their portion to £24.50. Our diocesan subscription for 2025 will remain at £35 per member and £60 for joint membership. Can I remind branch leaders and treasurers that if you are having to consider closing a branch or moving to Prayer & Fellowship group, please in the first instance contact Jenny Harrison, our secretary to be guided on the correct steps to take.

Standing Orders: More important than ever, there are still standing orders that have not been amended to reflect the increase in subscription. Many are still at £26, £27, £28, £30, £32. Please, please can you check that your standing order is up to date? I have been reporting this for several years and still they remain.

My thanks to Carol Reynolds, who for many years has completed the Consolidation Report. I am now in the process of completing the 2023 report. Can I take this opportunity to remind treasurers of the Regulation 12. 4. When distributing the funds your Branch has raised, only keep sufficient funds for immediate requirements in your bank account. We have been advised by Mary Sumner House that no branch (active or Prayer & Fellowship) (although P & F groups should not be holding onto a bank account, if you are please contact me) should be hoarding more than £100 in their branch account. Anything over this amount should be sent to the Diocesan Office for projects; the exception is if you can show that you have a purpose for any excess amount over £100. If you require a copy of "Regulation 12" please get in touch. I will put this (£100) on the next trustees' agenda to agree raising the £100 to £200 taking into consideration the cost of living increases. Within the next few months I will also be writing to all treasurers, as it is quite a while since I last communicated with some of you.

Finally, the Holiday Fund is financially in a good position, branches and individuals have been making generous donations towards the 'Welcome Packs', thank you everyone. As it is more than probable that I will be reporting an over spend on our working income and expenditure, donations to the General fund would be very welcomed.

EXTRACTS FROM WINDOWS GONE BY - WINTER 1997

One of the oldest editions of Windows in the Mothers' Union Office is dated Winter 1997 and was the time when Margery Gill was just coming to the end of her term as Diocesan President and Carol Reynolds was stepping up to be the next Diocesan President. Back in 1997 Windows had no photographs and looking through it I am reminded of how much Mothers' Union has changed and evolved over the past 27 years. Here are four of my chosen extracts:

The Diocesan Annual General Meeting was held on the 10th June in Verwood Parish Centre at 7.15 pm. Sixty people attended and the President welcomed everyone to the meeting. "A Service of Light" was then led by the Rev Alan Gill. Margery reported that a familiar question was often asked – how do you get new and younger members – (interesting to note that this question is still being asked today!). The Guest Speaker Rev Bob Bailey from RAF Lyneham admitted to having a "conversion experience" after reading the Aims and Objects of MU! However he foresaw that we are heading for stormy waters and that the organization could flounder. (Fortunately Rev Bob's prophesy did not come true back in the late 1990's but as you all know these days we are again approaching stormy waters).

Under Branch News – West Lavington & The Cheverells held a service in June to celebrate their Centenary with the support of local dignitaries and relations of past members. An in-mate of Erlestoke Prison had made a beautifully decorated cake which was enjoyed by all after the service. (I am pleased to say that West Lavington MU – not sure what happened to The Cheverells - is still going strong today).

Under AFIA Report – Pam Montgomerie gave a very short but succinct message in that the caravan season has been successful and in fact there is a waiting list of next year. I am pleased to say that this is still the case and is one of our ongoing and most successful diocesan projects.

To end this short round-up I will quote from World-Wide News and Jean Downham wrote:

'I have recently received a letter from Mama Mariam Ayoub, President of West Sudan (Kadugli Diocese) who says "Please pass our love and greetings to all MU members at Salisbury Diocese. Continue to pray for the Church in Kadugli and for peace in Sudan".

IN THEIR SHOES - Guernsev

Some years ago, I came across an article in a 2008 Mothers' Union Magazine from Glasgow about domestic abuse and how the members had gathered shoes together to provide a strong message about its effect on women. As a result of that the Soroptimists in Guernsey in 2011 put on an exhibition with the assistance of the local Women's Aid, Refuge, Options (now Safer), the Police and the team responsible for Relationship Education in schools. Young people were asked to draw their ideas of shoes to reflect the problem and were provided with some of the sentences women had written to show how they were affected by such abuse. The Exhibition

took place in the Royal Court Great Hall and educated the many visitors who came along during the week that it was in place.

Several are now up in our loos. We showed a commitment to praying for the campaign and for victims of abuse throughout the year, as well as attending the annual '16 Days' service in the Cathedral.

We have joined the 'Friends of Salisbury Women's Refuge' scheme and have pledged to raise a minimum of £40 a year for this. In addition, we have held other fund-raising

events to add to the amount and also donated items for 'Moving On' packs and Christmas presents for the families.

A CHANCE MEETING

A chance meeting with an old colleague and his wife Rosemary, several years ago and the ensuing conversation led to discovering the rarity of the orchids in our churchyard at St. Mary's, West Moors.

Over lunch, we caught up on our interests following retirement and discovered that they had both become involved with the National Arboretum at Westonbirt. Rosemary was a keen photographer and this, coupled with her interest in flora, led to a conversation about native orchids. Our West Moors Mothers' Union Group had previously been on a very interesting, guided walk, led by a senior member of Kingston Lacy staff, around the fields at Pamphill, Wimborne, when we had seen a lot of orchids. We decided to go and visit the fields after lunch, but unfortunately it was still a bit early in the season and hardly any of the orchids were out. I mentioned that we had some in our churchyard and we could visit this on our way home.

When Rosemary saw the orchids she was excited as she was able to identify them as the Green-winged Orchid, which were very rare. She took some photos and asked if the site was registered with Dorset Wildlife as they would have been interested. At the time we were concerned it could have led to restrictions on how we managed the churchyard, but I did get a few tips from her, which have helped us to increase the numbers and the area in which they grow. We were also pleased and surprised a couple of years ago when we had Autumn Lady's Tresses Orchids appear as well.

When the Living Churchyards Project was launched our Vicar was very keen that we should join the project, and this has helped in our being awarded a Silver Certificate in the EcoChurch scheme.

This year the fine display of orchids attracted the attention of Dorset Wildlife and a Conservation Officer came to do a survey of all the grasses and other plants that may be present, recording 15 notable grassland



plant species, "A good example of really species-rich grassland which has been preserved through the good management of the churchyard over the past years." Our churchyard is now being put forward for recognition as a Site of Nature Conservation Interest (SNCI) in Dorset.

I wanted to share the following letter with you as it shows what a great impact Sheila had in her work with the MU in South Sudan.

An email message from Aida Wande, 16 May 2024

Subject: Condolences message

Dear Anne Salter, family members of late Madam Sheila Soper, friends and the entire Christians of Wimborne Deanery

I am writing with heavy heart and sadness for the peaceful death of our mentor, role model, our beloved mother in the Lord and committed supporter of Mother Union's, may God almighty Rest her soul in the internal peace. Amen.

The entire Mothers Union of the two Dioceses of Yambio and Nzara have lost very important person in their ministry, the person who tough them to know the meaning of MU and know more about the work of God they are doing. The woman women could flee over up to Yambio and Nzara to train Mothers Union and feed them as well. The individuals she supported either paying their school fees, rentals or medical will be missing her in their daily life.

My tears can't stop rolling when remembering her teachings with Mothers Union, her preachings in Timbiro All Saints Cathedral, and in Karika Parish, her love and support towards me, I and AB Samuel will organize a memorial service for her life.

The last assignment she gave me was to rebuild the ECS guest house toilets and bathrooms which we are remained with fixing of the doors and windows, I believe and spirit will continue to pray for us.

As Yambio Diocese, we will continue to remember her legacy and good service in the Church of the lord.

Dear family members friends and the entire Christians of Wimborne denary, let's keep praying for each other, and let us keep our relations intact.


